Top things to sea and do

The Barbican and Sutton Harbour

Come and experience Plymouth's stunning Waterfront, with far-reaching sea views, cobbled streets and family attractions including the largest aguarium in the country. Discover the vibrancy and rich heritage of Britain's



Ocean City by strolling through Sutton Harbour and the Barbican, where you'll find more than 200 listed buildings lining the historic streets. Enjoy some fresh fish and chips or a **Plymouth Gin** cocktail from the distillery itself – the oldest continuous working gin distillery in England.

If afternoon tea is your preference, you'll find a delightful selection of wonderfully

quaint teashops on the Barbican. The shopping is great too, with lots of independent boutique shops and art galleries to explore.

> Dive into the National Marine Aquarium, where you can meet over 4,000 ocean animals and learn about their groundbreaking ocean conservation work. Cross the lock-bridge and step out onto the Mayflower Steps Memorial, then find out about the Pilgrims' voyage at the nearby Mayflower Museum.



Only a 15-minute walk from the Barbican is The Box, the UK's most significant cultural initiative in 2020. Plymouth's new museum, art gallery and cultural centre tells the stories of international and local significance through immersive experiences and amazing objects, including over two million artefacts!

Plymouth Hoe

Plymouth Hoe offers picturesque views across Plymouth Sound, the UK's first National Marine Park. So sit and enjoy. stroll or climb the 93 steep steps of Smeaton's Tower, a former lighthouse and one of the city's most famous landmarks.

During the summer, you can cool down with a dip in the art deco Tinside Lido. consistently voted in the top 10 of Europe's outdoor pools.

> Look out for 'Look II' on West Hoe Pier, an impressive sculpture by the world-renowned artist Sir Antony Gormley – it's the perfect spot for a selfie! Children will love the variety of activities around West Hoe Park from trains, swings, crazy golf and even a pirate ship.

Food and Drink

The Waterfront has an array of outstanding places to eat and drink to suit all tastes. You can enjoy the variety of international cuisine or traditional dishes,

offering a great choice of locally sourced culinary delights.

For cocktail lovers you'll be spoilt for choice, with lots of friendly bars serving fresh zingy cocktails.



Marinas

With five Gold Anchor Award winning marinas in Plymouth, there's lots of great places to berth your boat whilst visiting the Waterfront. They include: King Point Marina, Mayflower 🦺 🕻 Marina, Plymouth Yacht Haven, Queen Anne's Battery and Sutton Harbour Marina.



Bv Bus

Travel around the Waterfront by bus using Plymouth Citybus number 25, which links the city centre, the Barbican and the Hoe, and the number 34 which links the city centre to Royal William Yard.

On Foot

Explore the beautiful scenery and fascinating history with the many heritage walks on offer by downloading the free Plymouth Trails app.



Plymouth is on a crossroads of National Cycle Network routes 2 and 27 and has many cycle paths to follow, making it the perfect way explore the incredible Waterfront.

Pick up the South West Coast Path and follow the Waterfront Walkway starting at Admiral's Hard, you'll encounter iconic naval buildings and amazing

Royal William Yard

Soak up the vibrant atmosphere of Royal William Yard, the former naval victualling yard, where its grade I Listed Buildings have been reborn into cafes, bars, restaurants



and art galleries - now a foodie and cultural hotspot. Experience Ocean Studios, a hub of creative activity with retail pop-ups and artists' studios.







Out on the Water

It's no surprise that Plymouth has a great choice of boat trips on offer, departing from the Barbican and Cremyll. Choose from Mount Edgcumbe, the quaint fishing village of Cawsand (seasonal), or nearby Royal William Yard (seasonal). Chartered fishing trips and harbour cruises are also available, including to Drake's Island.

Watersports

For the more adventurous, why not learn to kayak or standup paddleboard at the Mount Batten Watersports and Activities Centre, or explore the coastline around Royal William Yard by paddleboard. If you're a fan of scuba diving, Plymouth's Waterfront has some top dive centres. and so much to explore. Plymouth Sound boasts more than 1,000 different types of animals, and some of the most protected and best managed waters.
