

There is an 85 space car park on New Road Cawsand and 120 space central car park on Fore Street in Kingsand.

The 25 bus travels from Royal Parade in Plymouth's City Centre and stops at the Barbican and Plymouth Hoe in less than 10 minutes where you can pick up the ferry to Cawsand at the Barbican Wharves Hub. At busy times it can be worth parking in the City Centre and catching this service as it leaves from the A16 bus stop outside House of Fraser.

The 70A/70B buses travels from Royal Parade in Plymouth's City Centre (from the A3 bus stop outside the Guildhall) to Cawsand and Kingsand.

BARBICAN WHARVES HUB

It's really easy to get around Plymouth - with much of the city easily walkable, plus scenic bus, cycling and water taxi routes. Explore the city by water with ferries and water taxis throughout the year connecting the Barbican Wharves Hub with Mount Batten and the Royal William Yard, as well as Mount Edgcumbe and Cawsand in Cornwall.

There are two main car parks in easy reach of both the Barbican and The Hoe, the Elphinstone car park on Madeira Road and the Lambhay Hill car park. A short walk away, the Lockyer's Quay and Harbour car parks are just across the Lock and Pedestrian Footway, and the nearby Exchange Street car park is situated off Vauxhall Street. There is also plenty of street parking on Hoe Road running alongside the waterfront and along Citadel Road's adjacent streets. Just a 10 minutes walk away, Plymouth's City Centre is home to the larger multi storey car parks including Drake Circus with over 1200 spaces, the Theatre Royal, Regent Street, Civic Centre and Derry's Cross.

The 25 bus travels from Royal Parade in Plymouth City Centre and stops at the Barbican, Sutton Harbour and Plymouth Hoe in less than 10 minutes. At busy times it can be worth parking in the City Centre and catching this service as it leaves from the A16 bus stop, outside House of Fraser.

The Hoe

As one of the most perfect natural harbours in the world, Plymouth Hoe on the City's stunning waterfront offers a large green space and breath-taking views across Plymouth Sound. Standing 72 feet high, the iconic Smeaton's Tower lighthouse is situated here and offers fantastic views from its lantern room. The Hoe is a focal point for the city and the location for some of our biggest events including Armed Forces and the British Firework Championships. It is also home to the Royal Citadel, the City's war memorials, the Art Deco Tinside Lido and the famous green where Sir Francis Drake played bowls awaiting news of the Spanish Armada.



Mount Batten

For those looking to enjoy adventurous outdoor activities, this former RAF site is now home to the Mount Batten Watersports and Activities Centre and the 5 Gold Anchor marina, Plymouth Yacht Haven. Enjoy exploring the quaint village of Turnchapel and the Mount Batten peninsula, or take coastal walks to Jennycliff to be amazed by the cliff top views stretching for miles down the coast and across Plymouth Sound, and to Bovisand, an Area of Outstanding Beauty, offering sandy beaches. For a more relaxed visit, the Mount Batten Pub offers a warm welcome.



The Barbican & Sutton Harbour

is one of Plymouth's most popular places to visit, with quaint cobbled streets, a picturesque harbour and a wealth of independent shops, galleries, bars, cafés and restaurants along the water's edge. Here you can visit the UK's largest aquarium attraction at the National Marine Aquarium and the famous Plymouth Gin Distillery. Be the first to see the theatre stars of the future at the Barbican Theatre, and discover the latest independent cinema and art gallery at the nearby Plymouth Arts Centre. The Barbican is also home to the authentic Elizabethan House where you can step back in time to Drake's Plymouth, and to the Mayflower Steps which commemorate the departure of the Pilgrim Fathers who set sail on their voyage to the New World 1620. You can learn more about this historic voyage at the Mayflower Museum housed above the Barbican Tourist Information Centre

Cremyll and Mount Edgcumbe, Cornwall
